

Card of The Week:




Charlie "Old Hoss" Radbourne

This is a Deckle Edge Art Card issued in 1984. It is Series 1, and features the art work of sports Artist Ron Lewis. The series includes all Hall of Famers inducted up until 1946. This is the Hoss Radbourne Card # 2. I bought this limited set of 45 cards when I was in Cooperstown in 1991. It's set #1447 0f 10,000. A recent set sold on Ebay for \$50. I bought the cards for \$10. My shrewd investment is paying off nicely. An exhausting search on Google (5 minutes) could not find a Series 2. So this 1 of a kind set is going in my will this week. My daughter Jessica will love it. (Adam would probably just toss them in a drawer, like he did with his hamster. Pickles' mummified corpse was found several years later.)

Radbourne never played in the SCL, but I wanted to use this card as a Card of The Week, because the artwork is based on Radbourne's 1887 Old Judge Tobacco Card, and something is missing. Radbourne was in an 1886 Boston Beaneaters' team photo and he's shown resting his hands on a teammate's shoulders, flipping the bird. It's believed to be the 1st know photo of this still popular lewd hand gesture. In the below Tobacco Card of Radbourne you can clearly see he did it again, possibly becoming the 2nd person photographed flipping the bird.

Why did Ron Lewis not include the bird? Did he sell out his artistic integrity to the highest bidder? Would da Vinci sell out? Picasso? Renoir? Matisse? Michelangelo? Rockwell? Of course not, they would have included the bird. I hope you're happy with your filthy lucre Ron Lewis!!
